

# Radioactive lodine in the Atmosphere : from source term to dose Status of IRSN research

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Radioactive iodine isotope dispersion into the environment is a problem of main concern due to possible human health impact.

The half life of some radioiodine isotopes implies possible dispersion into all compartments of the environment - from the troposphere to the terrestrial or marine biosphere and finally into the food chain - inducing potential human exposure.





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Research at IRSN on iodine dispersion in the atmospheric compartment is aimed to address the major issues of this problematic:

- 1/ accurate source term evaluation for realistic dose assement
- 2/ improve crisis management to better protect the public in case of accidental radioactive iodine release into the atmosphere.

IRSN is currently sustaining large research efforts covering all the aspects linked to this issue





#### Severe Accident = major release into the environnement

Over the past 30 years IRSN has sustained large efforts to improve the understanding of lodine release in SA conditions and to reduce uncertainty on source term evaluation

**Development of predictive model implemented in IRSN softwares:** 

<u>ASTEC code</u>: detailed modelling of severe accident phenomenology - safety studies and uncertainty evaluation

MER and PERSAN codes: expert tools dedicated resp. to PSA level 2 studies and to crisis managment

Iodine release: routine emission to atmosphere - the different anthropogenic sources

Production of radioiodine for medical purpose

<sup>123</sup>I, <sup>125</sup>I, <sup>131</sup>I, <sup>133</sup>I authorised release up to several hundred of GBq depending on national policies

Some measurable events (Pres. Of O. Masson and G. Steinhauser)

<u>Fuel reprocessing plants (Orano , La Hague)</u> <sup>129</sup>I only, authorisation up to 18 GBq (mainly released in liquid effluent, less than 1% as gaseous species)

actual release below limit by 30%, measurable close to the plant

NPPs - case in France <sup>131</sup>I, <sup>133</sup>I, authorised release up to 0.4 GBq, actual average data: 0.016 GBq

hardly detected

Other sources Sewage and waste water treatment plant: <sup>131</sup>I linked to medical use very low release (10<sup>-3</sup> Bq/m3), seldom detected

#### lodine Atmospheric tranfer: main phenomena



→ Processes dependent of the iodine physico chemical forms Gaseous species: inorganic ( $I_2$ , INOx, IO, radicals) // organic ( $CH_3I$ ,  $CH_2I_2...$ ) Particles: ultrafine particles ( $I_xO_y$ ) to larger aerosols

 $\rightarrow$  Strong evolution of iodine forms with time and distance:

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IRSN environmental modelling tools: prediction of iodine (and others RNs) dispersion - evaluation of the health impact :

C3X plateform: <u>atmospheric dispersion</u> at short and long distance in case of accidental release, crisis tool

SYMBIOSE (co-developed with EDF): simulate the transfer of radionuclides in all compartments of the biosphere and evaluate the subsequent dose impact to human and non human populations

CONDOR: expert tool for assessing the exposure of members of the public to radioactive releases from a facility (liquid and atmospheric releases during normal operation or accidental releases)

Following the recommendation of the ICRP the three main iodine chemical forms are considered for dose calculations (exposure by inhalation) :  $I_2$ , ICH<sub>3</sub> and particulate iodine (1 µm AMAD)

But no physico chemical evolution is taken into account after emission

> Need to better model iodine atmospheric behaviour to improve prediction of land contamination and human exposure as well as to optimize countermeasures



#### lodine atmospheric tranfer: homogeneous and heterogenous reactivity



- Improving the understanding of gas phase chemistry
  - Org-I and I<sub>x</sub>O<sub>v</sub> Photolysis and determination of nucleation conditions
  - Use of theoretical chemistry tools for reaction pathway identification
- Heterogeneous reactivity between I<sub>g</sub> and tropospheric aerosols
  - Adsorption / desorption processes
  - Photolysis of iodinated particles

# Dry deposition: data from litt. compilation but large uncertainties

Deposition velocity (m/s)	ICH <sub>3</sub>	I <sub>2</sub>	l-aerosols

- → Work on dry deposition of ultrafine particles completed<sup>(1)</sup>
- $\rightarrow$  Determination of I<sub>2</sub> and ICH<sub>3</sub> dry deposition velocities on meadow cover in progress<sup>(2)</sup>

# Washout - very few exp. data : estimations only (rainout, fog and cloud impact not taken into account)

Washout (h/mm/s)	ICH <sub>3</sub>	I <sub>2</sub>	I-aerosols
estimation	10 <sup>-6</sup>	10-4	10 <sup>-4</sup>

- $\rightarrow$  Important deposition pathway for I<sub>2</sub> and I-aer (soluble species) but complex system
- → Work on iodine speciation in rain drops and transfer in the forest ecosystem in progress

# Re-emission not considered in modelling tools: very few data and large uncertainties

# From terrestrial surface

- Wind re-suspension: very large uncertainties (3 orders of magnitude)
- Role of bioaerosols
- Re-emisison of gaseous species from soils: chemical or biogenic processes ?

# From the marine environment:

- Main contributor of iodine release in the atmosphere
- Biogenic contribution from algae, photolysis in the marine surface micro layer.
- Work to better characterise I<sup>129</sup> behaviour after release by ORANO spent fuel reprocessing plant at LaHague (liquid release in the sea) :
  - I<sup>129</sup> speciation in the marine layer
  - I<sup>129</sup> enrichment in algae

#### Iodine atmospheric tranfer: Monitoring tools

IRSN has developped over the past 30 years a network of sampling stations covering the whole french metropolitan territory and dedicated to monitor the presence of RN in the atmosphere (particulate material)

2011-2015 update: stations implemented with a line dedicated to the sampling of gaseous radioactive iodine species (charcoal filters)





**Red : high flow rate, green : medium** flow rate + gaseous iodine monitorin line, yellow : currently installed

Future development focused on :

Increasing significantly the sensitivity of gaseous species detection

Filter device dedicated to the separation of gaseous inorganic, organic iodine species



#### Dosimetry and iodine prophylaxis:

Accurate evaluation of radiation dose from radioactive iodine incorporated by exposed people is an important issue. IRSN has developped two strategies :

Prospective evaluation based on simulation tools (CONDOR)

Modelling iodine transfer in the environnement and exposure pathways of the population (external irradiation, inhalation and ingestion)

Equivalent dose and effective dose determined from ICRP recommended dose coef.

-> Expert tool for comparison with regulatory limits in case of routine discharge

<u>Retrospective evaluation from individual in vivo measurements</u> Specific calibration phantoms and measurements devices developped for lodine measurement in the thyroid Mobile units dedicated to emergency situations

- Developpment of improved mobile detectors : featuring a good sensitivity and easy to use (IRSN patent)
- → Harmonization of in vivo measurements protocol with european partners (Cathymara project) : intercomparison for spectroscopic devices (12 countries, 28 devices tested)
- Development of thyroid calibration phantoms suitable for young children (IRSN patent)

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### Dosimetry and iodine prophylaxis: PRIODAC research program

- Iodine thyroid blocking (ITB) is considered as an appropriate strategy for reducing the risk of adverse health outcomes in people exposed to an accidental release of radioactive iodine. In France, the current prophylaxis policies consist in a single administration of KI (+ one repeat at most) - adapted for a short exposure.
- In case of repeated release of radioactive iodine (e.g. Fukushima accident), such policies needs to be extended with multiple administration of KI → research priority



IRSN PRIODAC research program (2014-2022)<sup>(1)</sup>:

Determine modalities of repeated administrations of stable potassium iodide (KI) in a situation of chronic/repeated releases

Assess the possible side effects

Better understand the molecular mechanism regulating the metabolism of iodine



Main outcomes:



Definition a KI dose regimen (1 mg/kg daily for 8 days) which provide satisfactory thyroid protection level [63% - 88%] and no side effects on adult rats Research now focused on most sensitive categories (young rats, pregnant rats)

# Develop new recommendations related to the administration of KI and contribute to a better international harmonization.
